Whilst stopping in Gascoyne Junction, take the time to explore the Historical Museum situated in the original Road Board building located adjacent to the Gascoyne Junction Visitor Centre. Take a drive over the Killili Bridge and visit the Waterhole filled with water year round. It is the perfect spot to enjoy a picnic, watch out for birdlife, or at night, sit back and watch the stars and milky way shine above you. It is one of many places to enjoy waterfront serenity across the Shire.

Spend some time walking through the Two Rivers Memorial Park and taking in the town War Memorial highlighting the strong connection between the Upper Gascoyne and the Australian Lighthorsemen, and VH-DMT a tribute to the aerial mustering pioneers in our region. Then take a seat and face west to watch

KENNEDY RANGE NATIONAL PARK

The beautiful gorges and red rock landscape of Kennedy Range National Park will be a highlight of your wander outback. Perfect for a four wheel drive adventure, Kennedy Range National Park is the place to go camping under a star filled night sky. Here, you are surrounded by pristine wilderness. Go bushwalking and explore gorges and sandstone cliffs, see native animals, birds and at the right time of year Dawson's Burrowing Bees, and look out over the vast plains of pastoral country. The Temple Gorge camp site within Kennedy Range National Park is 56 kilometres north of Gascoyne Junction. There are camp hosts situated at the camp site in peak times to collect camping fees.

Kennedy Range is a flora and fauna haven 90km in length with stunning cliffs, springs and canyons. Rising up to 100 metres above the valley, the Kennedy Range plateau has dominated the surrounding plains for millions of years. With red sand dunes, spinifex, wattle and mallee trees scattered throughout the area, this is what the Aussie Outback is all about. Bushwalking trails run from the northern visitor site and camping area, and take you into gorges where you will see honeycomb like rock formations. The best time to visit is late autumn and early spring. A 4WD only Kennedy Loop Track takes you around the park from a base in Gascoyne Junction. Details are available from the Gascoyne Junction Visitor Information Centre.

MT AUGUSTUS NATIONAL PARK

Mount Augustus is an 'inselberg', meaning 'island mountain', that rises 715m above the surrounding alluvial plain. The world's largest rock is situated approximately 300km north east of Gascoyne Junction and is around 8km long and 3km wide. You will encounter rocky creeks, gorges, open plains, Aboriginal rock engravings (petroglyphs) and a variety of wildlife.

It is about twice the size of Uluru and is known by the local Wajarri Aboriginal people as Burringurrah. Interesting rock formations,

caves and Aboriginal engravings are found on many parts of the rock that have been untouched for thousands of years. Emu Hill and Yalaweerie Lookout's provide stunning views from which to take a wonderful sunrise or sunset photo of the Mount. Burringurrah Drive is a 49km circuit providing views of the changing faces of the rock, whilst also providing access to all the feature sites and hiking trails. This drive is suitable for conventional two wheel drive vehicles.

ONE DAY IN THE UPPER GASCOYNE

With a day to spend in the Upper Gascoyne spend time in Gascoyne Junction visiting the iconic gates of the Junction Race Club, spend time exploring the Gascoyne Junction Town Museum and take a self guided walking tour of town. Take a 2 hour return drive to Kennedy Range National Park and explore this ancient landscape.

THREE DAYS IN THE UPPER GASCOYNE

Spend a day exploring Gascoyne Junction and then stay the night to enjoy #junctionpubgrub at the Gascoyne Junction Pub & Tourist Park. Head north the following day to camp under the stars at the Kennedy Range National Park and walk the numerous trails on offer from the iconic Honeycomb Gorge Trail to the epic views afforded by the Escarpment Trail. Continue your journey to the world's largest rock and explore Mount Augustus National Park staying at the neighbouring Mount Augustus Tourist Park situated on a working station.

MORE DAYS

Book an indigenous experience at Kennedy Range National Park with Wooramulla Eco Cultural Journeys, take on the challenge of the Kennedy Range 4WD Loop Track for experienced off roaders or spend another night or two at Mount Augustus to complete the 12km summit trail (open seasonally) or the many other walks including Edneys Trail and the Petroglyph Walk.

Explore GASCOYNE JUNCTION



COBBLED ROAD:

The pioneering spirit shines as you stand on a preserved section of the Cobbled Road network enroute to Kennedy Range National Park from Gascoyne Junction. As the end of the era of teamsters and cameleers closed in the 1920s with the emergence of the motorised truck, a road network was constructed across the region by hand by truck drivers to combat the challenges of traversing this remote part of Western Australia to get mail and supplies delivered.

WATERHOLE:

A permanent body of water in Gascoyne Junction, the Waterhole has always been a special place from ancient times to present day. This tranquil setting is the perfect spot to watch birdlife during the day or to see the stars sparkle above in this Astrotourism Dark Sky Town each evening.





CATTLE POOL:

Part of Mount Augustus National Park and 6km to the west of the Mount Augustus Tourist Park lies Cattle Pool, a permanent waterhole in the Lyons River. A tranquil spot to enjoy a picnic lunch with views of the water and the world's largest rock. Take a refreshing dip or unload the canoe. Take the Corella Trail (Goolinee) a short 500m return walk along the south bank of Cattle Pool to enjoy birdlife including corellas, blue winged kookaburras and sacred kingfishers.

AMAZING TREE:

Founded by local pastoralists, the Amazing Tree is an amazing spot for a rest on the Cobra Dairy Creek Road between Gascoyne Junction and Mount Augustus. Surviving harsh summers and many floods the branches of the amazing tree have created a spectacle that needs to be seen to be believed.





TWO RIVERS MEMORIAL:

The Two Rivers Memorial Park was opened in 2021 restoring a part of Gascoyne Junction impacted by the 2010 Flood Event. This visitor stop is a day rest area with shaded picnic tables, public restrooms and a green lawn for picnics. Learn about the history of aerial mustering and the local pioneer of the industry Laurie Bain. Stand beneath the wings of his aircraft VH-DMT or time your visit around a music in the park event at the Two Rivers Amphitheatre.

GASCOYNE JUNCTION WAR MEMORIAL:

Opened in 2019, the Gascoyne Junction War Memorial stands on the Gregory Street side of the Two Rivers Memorial Park and is the place where the Gascoyne Junction ANZAC Day Service is held annually. The unique sculpture was designed by Smith Sculptors in Perth to reflect the heritage of the Upper Gascoyne region.





Take an unforgettable road trip into the real outback and explore some of the oldest landscapes on earth, rich in Aboriginal and pastoral history. Discover the 'real' Australia, with it's rugged red earth and timeless beauty. There is great accommodation on offer with self contained units, chalets, workers guarters, caravan and camping sites.

MT AUGUSTUS TOURIST PARK

LOCATION: COBRA - MOUNT AUGUSTUS ROAD, EAST LYONS RIVER WA 6705



Laying directly in the heart of the Gascoyne region you will find our beautiful tourist park often described as a 'Green Oasis'. Sit back and relax and watch the different colours and shades of the rock as the sun passes over it. Enjoy one of our powered grass sites for caravans and campers or choose one of our unpowered bush camp sites. Communal facilities include toilet block with hot showers, camp kitchen; laundry, dump point and disabled toilets. We also have a range of on site accommodation ranging from twin rooms to self contained family units. Enquire on arrival about meals available at our restaurant. Serving "Shorthorn" beef straight from the Mt Augustus Station, taste the mouthwatering difference, make sure you book in on arrival as to avoid disappointment as we book out fast. The Tourist Park also has a fully stocked shop with most items available, diesel & unleaded, gas refills and tyre repairs.

TEMPLE GORGE CAMPGROUND

LOCATION: KENNEDY RANGE ACCESS ROAD, KENNEDY RANGE NATIONAL PARK (60km North of Gascoyne Junction)

DBCA provides visitors to Kennedy Range National Park with a dedicated campground at Temple Gorge to enjoy a night under the stars in the ranges. The camping area has a single bush toilet. During the winter months the DBCA Camp Hosts are camped in the Kennedy Range to help with any questions and point you in the right direction. Water is not available in the park so be sure to bring sufficient supplies. Bookings are not required however camp site fees are payable to Camp Hosts or by utilising the honesty box at the campground. Winnemia campground is the perfect opportunity to immerse yourself in the starlit serenity of the region and explore the Kennedy Range National Park. Various nature-based camping sites are available for your swag, tent, camper trailer or caravan. Access to rustic toilets and showering facilities are available for campsite visitors, however, bring your own facilities is recommended,


especially water for the duration of your stay as there are no facilities to refill. Bookings essential.

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

KINGSFORD SMITH MAIL RUN



3 Days Meekatharra to Carnarvon

Follow in the wheel ruts of transport pioneer Charles Kingsford Smith along the Kingsford Smith Mail Run. Smithy, as he was known, once trundled along this very route on his mail run from Carnarvon east to Meekatharra, via Gascoyne Junction. You'll discover much about Kingsford Smith along the way - and some of his larrikin antics. You'll also learn much about early transport and communication. The Kingsford Smith Mail Run also includes the geological wonder, Mount Augustus. This massive mount soars 715m above the surrounding plain and is rich in Aboriginal history.



WOOL WAGON PATHWAY

4 Days Geraldton to Exmouth

The Wool Wagon Pathway epitomises the true Australian outback. It is a land of distinct horizons, glorious KENNEDY RANGE vistas, unlimited sunshine, wonderous dawns and sunsets and spectacular night skies. Here you will travel through some of Australia's legendary sheep and wool country. You can drive the Wool Wagon Pathway in either direction. Start at MURCHISON Geraldton or Yalgoo and head north from SETTLEMENT Pindar, a historic railhead for the region, WOOLEEN STATION into the Murchison and Gascoyne. Another option is to drive the Wool Wagon Pathway southward from Exmouth, travelling a remote outback road to Gascoyne Junction and into the Murchison.



Outback NIGHT SKIES

EXPERIENCE MAGICAL NIGHT SKIES

Gascoyne Junction and the Upper Gascoyne are recognised as an Astrotourism WA town and region. The stars shine brightly event to the naked eye, and only get better with a telescope in hand. With low levels of light pollution, the starts leap out of the sky and the Milky Way seems so close that you can reach out and touch it.

For a unique experience visit www.wooramulla.com. au and take Kennedy Range Overnight Star Story Adventure from late June to early September through the lens of an local indigenous guide. Star Stories at Mundatharra (Kennedy Range) is for many a spiritual experience. A sacred place, this is the heart of Yinggarda Country where many Yinggarda Dreaming stories were born and have been shared over millennia. In the total absence of noise and light pollution, you will experience the night sky as it was when Yinggarda ancestors walked this country. Afterwards enjoy campfire yarns, Kangaroo curry and fresh baked damper.


Outback Skies STARGAZING DATES

Kennedy LOOP 4WD TRACK



AN EPIC ROAD **ADVENTURE** AWAITS...

The Kennedy Loop Track is an adventure just waiting for the 4WD enthusiast. Test your skills and journey into the remote and rugged beauty of Kennedy Range National Park. There is no phone service, no fuel and the track is suitable only for 4WD vehicles with their experienced crew. The track has been rated moderate with extreme places providing access to the remote Western side of the Kennedy Range before crossing over the range top to enjoy the more accessible eastern side. Travellers will need to allow a minimum of 1.5 days to complete this 270km epic trip from Junction to Junction.

THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE KENNEDY LOOP TRACK

- Junction the Kennedy Loop Track is 270km. You will need to allow a minimum of 1.5 days to complete the track.
- For 50% of the track your top speed will be between 10km per hour and 50km per hour.
- The track along the western side of the range and over the top is suitable only for high clearance 4WD vehicles.
- 4WD tracks are impassable after heavy rain. Rainfall is erratic and tracks may be closed at anytime.

- From Gascoyne Junction to Gascoyne Check road conditions with Shire of Upper Gascoyne on our website www.uppergascoyne.wa.gov.au/ roadreport or Phone (08) 9943 0988
 - November to April is hot and uncomfortable for camping and potentially deadly if you get stuck in the remote area.
 - There are no facilities (toilets/ showers). You will need to be self sufficient.
 - Carry out what you carry in
 - It is a National Park. Do not take rocks, plants etc. from the park.

- There is no mobile phone coverage in the park.
- Many tracks are narrow. Be aware of oncoming traffic.
- Drive only on existing vehicle tracks.
- Carry adequate drinking water and supplies.
- Water from springs, creeks and bores is not suitable for drinking.
- There are no marked walk trails on the western side of the range.
- Pets are not permitted in Kennedy Range National Park.



DRIVING IN THE UPPER GASCOYNE:

With almost 58,000km² of land and 2000km of roads to explore on your wander outback it is important that you prepare for your epic road trip. We have prepared a special quide on preparing for your Upper Gascoyne getaway and for any outback adventure. You can download a copy from our website by using this QR code.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Do I need a 4WD?

No, most of our roads can be driven in a 2WD but you will be more comfortable in a 4WD. Upgrading your tyres from the standard issue highway tyres is also a top tip for traversing not only our unsealed roads but any you encounter on an outback getaway. In any vehicle we highly recommended travelling with two spare tyres for all your vehicles and to carry a supply of water for emergencies.

Are your roads OK?

Yes, 99% of the time our roads are fine and waiting for you to explore the real outback in the Upper Gascoyne. So feel free to plan accordingly. The only time this changes is if we have a significant rain event. With our roads spread across the Gascoyne River Catchment Area and with the most river, creek and gully crossings of any shire in Australia it does not take long for water to have an impact on road closures and conditions. We are used to this, and have plans in place to get everyone moving again as quickly as possible. This is why we advise to check the weather in our area in the week before you plan on arriving, and to check our road condition report.

Are your roads sealed?

Of our almost 2000kms of road only a little over 100km are sealed. The road between Carnarvon and Gascoyne Junction is fully


sealed, as is the next 50km of the Carnarvon Mullewa Road as you continue your journey east. You will also find some sealed road at the Landor T Intersection as you head towards the Landor Meekatharra Road.

How often are your roads graded?

Our road works team take great pride in their roads and throughout the year will grade each road once, with those roads seeing higher use graded more frequently. This can be impacted if we have had large rainfall where a priority is placed on repairing and restoring roads. When you arrive in Gascoyne Junction call into the Gascoyne Junction Community Resource and Visitor Information Centre and the friendly staff can give up to date advice on the best route for your journey.

DAWSON'S BURROWING Rees

MUNGURRAGURRA

From July to September, adult Dawson's Burrowing Bees occur as they forage blooming Poverty Bush and Rough Bluebell. At other times throughout the year, the species lie dormant as larvae in underground brood cells. The bees are endemic to the Upper Gascoyne and Carnarvon and are one of Australia's largest native bees. You will certainly hear them if they are nearby and if you notice drill holes on the road slow down or stop. If it is safe to do so try to take a route that avoids driving over the burrows. Some roads may be closed to protect bees so pay attention to road closure signs and adhere to them.
