COUNCILNEWS

<u>CEO Update</u>

This month has been centred largely on administrative tasks, meetings, monitoring projects.

I attended the opening of the new GDC offices situated in Robinson Street, Carnarvon. The office was opened by Minister Alannah McTiernan and attended by representatives for the Shires of Carnarvon, Shark Bay and Upper Gascoyne. It was pleasing to see the new CEO for Shark Bay in attendance given he has only been in the job for a week. The GDC now have a shop front and the offices are very nicely appointed. Whilst there I did invite the Minister to come out to Gascoyne Junction for a visit given that she has not made it out this far.

The new house is taking shape with all the internals having been completed except the carport which will be constructed in the next couple of weeks. The externals are coming along with the new retaining wall nearly ready for concrete and the electrical works only require sign off from Horizon Power. All in all this is a very nice house and will provide a great asset for the Shire for many years to come.

As of the last Council meeting, we were undertaking our End of Year audit with William Buck for the 20/21 financial year. To date this process is still ongoing with the Auditors who continue their review of our audit reports and are preparing to finalise it with the OAG. I am hopeful to have the reports signed off by the next Council meeting in November.



September was a busy month at the Community Resource Centre. Throughout September we hosted two more of our Be Connected Series and a second COVID Vaccine Clinic which again was well attended.The Shire of Upper Gascoyne is definitely rolling up their arms to get vaccinated.We also welcomed the judging panel for Tidy Towns in early September to judge our entry into the 2021 Tidy Towns Awards.They were very complimentary of our town and the community feel.A special thanks to Sean, Nat and Ali for doing what they always do so well and having the town looking beautiful to welcome them.We also welcomed students from Exmouth and Carnarvon who spent two nights visiting the Shire with the Stephen Michael Foundation learning about life outback. During their time spent here they visited Bidgemia to experience life on a station, the Kennedy Range National Park and spent a morning learning Stories of the Junction at the Gascoyne Junction Remote Community School.

Visitors continued to call in to learn about what to do and see on their visit to the area and all are pleasantly surprised by our region. Many have chosen to spend more than a night here to relax and explore which is wonderful that they find here so welcoming. We are continuing to update merchandise in the CRC and now have Gascoyne Junction Polo Shirts.

Work is continuing on the new library system and getting our current stock of books, audio books and DVD into the system.This is loaded onto one of our two new public use computers at the CRC that are all hooked up to the internet and printer for you to use.Discussions continue and we are slowly getting closer to having the return of a regular medical clinic at the Gascoyne Junction CRC. Equipment has been ordered and we are getting the space ready to house these items.

We have a busy month planned ahead in October with small grants received to provide Children's Week Activities and a Bike Safe initiative.Planning is well underway for the Community Christmas Party with more details being shared in the November edition of the Gassy Gossip.

There has been a bit more action down at the new tourist stop with footpaths and floor slabs being poured.GBSC have reached the decision to reconstruct the main carpark and bitumen surface.This will begin in the next few weeks.The new limestone wall has been constructed and we are working with the architect to design a "welcome" statement to go in front of it.

Construction Crew:

We have finally managed to get some bitumen down on the Carnarvon Mullewa road project.Fulton Hogan arrived onsite on the 12th of October and will seal approximately 7.2km of the 12 km section.We will finish constructing the remaining section before Downer return in December to complete sealing.Unfortunately we have had a setback with the base course material that was carted into the last 3.5km.Testing was conducted on the gravel pit and results indicated that it met Main Roads specification.However after carting the material in and working it we discovered that it was unsuitable and we were unable to get sufficient compaction.While the material looked and tested good it simply wasn't.We trialled blending it but it still did not perform as expected.We will cart this unsuitable material away and import conforming gravel.This will impact the overall budget however we believe this is a better outcome than constructing a road that will fail prematurely.

The Shire of Upper Gascoyne encourages visitors to experience our beautiful attractions and soak up everything the real Australian outback has to offer.

We are a large shire of 46,602 square kilometres with approximately 1,950kms of unsealed roads and our team takes great pride in looking after these roads to ensure everyone enjoys a safe comfortable drive.

Sometimes we need to close roads to traffic due to wet conditions. While this may be an inconvenience in the short term, we do it for your own safety and to ensure safe roads all year round for visitors and locals. It is important to check local weather conditions and forecasts before travelling on unsealed roads; this information can be found at www.bom.gov.au. Severe damage can occur to roads when people drive on closed or wet roads. It is not only extremely dangerous but can be costly for our shire to repair. Please consider those that live in the Shire of Upper Gascoyne and depend on these roads all year.

Please do not drive on our roads if they are closed. Penalties may apply to those who choose to ignore "Road Closed" signs and the shire may choose to prosecute offenders for the cost of repairs. If you have an accident or injury on a closed road, you may not be covered by your insurance company. This applies to locals and visitors alike.

We make every effort to minimise delays and appreciate your patience and assistance when roads are closed.



Century old junction

Joachim Azzopardi - A MEDAL has been struck to commemorate the centenary of Upper Gascoyne Shire.

The 37mm silver medal will be awarded to those who have been of service or contributed to the shire from 1907 to 2007.

Upper Gascoyne shire chief executive officer John Newton said the medal would also be available to friends of the shire to raise funds and ensure the centenary of the shire in 2007 was an unforgettable occasion.

The medal features a modified Upper Gascoyne Shire seal containing the Latin phrase Vias Tutas Cupimas, we want safe roads, which was the motto the first council members chose.

A black swan, the Southern Cross and bullrushes have also been included.

Aside from the limited metals, each friend would also receive a book on the history of the shire written by Bonnie Williams and have the opportunity to place a package in a time capsule to be opened in 2057. Gascoyne Junction Centenary committee chairman and shire councillor Inga Stocks said the event would be held in April next year to celebrate the festivity. The committee is meeting monthly to organise what has been described as a spectacle and one of the Gascoyne regions most significant events.

Cr Stocks said former residents who could not make it up for the event were welcome to attend a function at Kings Park in Perth.

After 100 years, Upper Gascoyne Shire is still continuing what it originally set out to do - build and maintain roads.

Cr Stocks said she would like to see the road from Carnarvon to Meekatharra sealed sometime this centenary and a river crossing built similar to Bibbawarra Road.

"The river crossing at times is unpassable for weeks" she said. "Some years this might only happen a couple of times but we has six last year".




BOOKS OF THE MONTH

A gentle book about dealing with emotions and calming toddler tantrums (and the grownup dealing with them!) together with an introduction to counting. The perfect picture book for handling bad days and bad moods.



BEWARE OF DOGS

She's isolated. Trapped. Hunted. An almost unbearably tense Australian survival thriller.

Alix Verhoeven, whose impulsive acceptance of an offer to spend Easter on a remote island has turned into a terrifying ordeal. Hiding in a tiny cave, she carefully rations out her meagre supplies, while desperately trying to figure out how to escape the men hunting her. She is determined not to be a victim.

What do they want with her? She knows it's nothing good - she overheard enough on that first night to flee. But now she's got little food or water, no way of calling for help, and only her skills as an exploration geologist to survive.

By day she is disciplined and lives by strict plans, but at night she finds herself haunted by questions about her life that she has never wanted to face, and her time is running out.





In keeping with our theme of remembering our friends whether near or far this week, the staff at the CRC have also sent these worksheets to our friends across the Shire with their own repair kit. There are some special prizes still to be won. The CRC are collecting entries of at least one completed page of the workbook to be returned to the CRC by November 30 with a sentence answering how you are bike safe when riding your bike with winners announced in the December Gassy Gossip.

To make sure the students had enough energy to ride back to school a sausage sizzle was shared for lunch with some delicious fruit for dessert. A fun day was had by all. VET CLINIC

Every two years the Shire arranges for a Vet Clinic to visit to provide services to the pets of the Upper Gascoyne. Monday October 25 saw nine dogs from across the Junction attend the clinic for sterlisation, micro chipping, immunisations and check ups. The clinic is manned by Vetrinarians and they are supported by University students studing Vet Science. Thanks to Ranger Pete for working with us on this iniative.

MEDICAL FACILITIES

We are moving closer to seeing a return of regular medical services at the Community Resource Centre. Conversations have been happening all year long and we are just getting into the final details. The main hold up at present is a lack of staff due to the impacts of COVID. Keep watching this space. We are working out whether a fornightly or monthly service would suit the community best so feel free to share your thoughts.

COVID CLINICS

Our final COVID Clinic will be held on November 18. This clinic is primarily for those residents who received their Astra Zeneca shot at the first clinic in August to get their second dose and become double vaxxed. In saying that, the clinic will be offering both Astra Zeneca and Pfizer to anyone who needs their first or second dose. We have started discussions about a clinic returning in March/April of 2022 for those who require a booster shot, however, after this clinic if you need to get a COVID Vaccine or a second dose you will need to book in Carnarvon or another suitable clinic. This clinic will be the fourth held in Gascoyne Junction and the support has been wonderful. We have had over 30 people attend the first two clinics and over 20 people attended the third. Thank you for doing your part in keeping our community safe.

NEW PUBLIC USE COMPUTERS

We are getting lots of positive feedback on your new public use computers at the Community Resource Centre and Library. These two new desktops have been made available through a grant from the WA State Library. The speed of the computers, and reliability of the internet along with updated Office programs has seen an increase of use in the just the past month of 75% of regular monthly use with residents using the computers to undertake online course to update their employment skills, checking emails whilst travelling and producing documents. We have loaded the new Library Manamgent Software and are busily entering our stock of books into the system to make it easier to search what books we have available.



TRAVELLING DURING A BUSHFIRE



BUSHFIRES CAN START WITHOUT WARNING. People have been killed or seriously injured during bushfires. If you are travelling or staying near bushland, fire is a real risk to you. Pack an emergency kit including important items such as woollen blankets, drinking water and protective clothing.

IF THERE IS A LOT OF SMOKE

- Slow down as there could be people, vehicles and livestock on the road.
- Turn your car headlights and hazard lights on.
- Close the windows and outside vents.
- If you can't see clearly, pull over and wait until the smoke clears.

- Park the vehicle off the roadway where there is little vegetation, with the vehicle facing towards the oncoming fire front.
- \bigcirc Turn the engine off.
- Close the car doors, windows and outside vents, <u>and call 000.</u>
- Stay in the car until the fire front has passed. Stay as close to the floor as possible and cover your mouth with a damp cloth to avoid inhalation of smoke.
- Stay covered in woollen blankets, continue to drink water and wait for assistance.
- Once the front has passed and the temperature has dropped, cautiously exit the vehicle.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- Find the local ABC radio frequency in the area you are travelling though. In a major emergency, when lives and property are at risk, ABC radio will issue broadcast warnings at a quarter to and a quarter past the hour.

- Check the weather forecast and current fire restrictions. Be aware of the Fire Danger Rating for the area you are travelling to and be prepared to reassess your plans.

CREAMY TOMATO AND SPINACH PASTA

Ingredients

2 cups penne pasta
1 brown onion
2 tbsp. tomato paste
50 g canned diced tomatoes
100 g fresh spinach
Freshly cracked black pepper to taste
2 cloves garlic or (2-3 tsp. minced garlic)
1 pinch crushed red pepper (optional)

1/2 tsp. salt
1 tbsp. olive oil
50g cream cheese
1/2 tsp. dried oregano
1/2 tsp. dried basil
1/4 cup grated parmesan



Method

1.Bring a large pot of water to a boil over high heat. Add the pasta and continue to boil until tender (7-10 minutes). Drain the pasta in a colander.

2.While the pasta is cooking, prepare the creamy tomato sauce. Dice the onion and mince the garlic. Add the onion, garlic, and olive oil to a large skillet and sauté over medium heat until the onions are soft and translucent (3-5 minutes).

3.Add the diced tomatoes, oregano, basil, crushed red pepper (optional), salt, and some freshly cracked pepper to the skillet. Stir to combine. Add the tomato paste and a 1/2 cup of water to the skillet and stir until the tomato paste has mixed into the sauce.

4.Turn the heat down to low. Cut the cream cheese into a few pieces and then add them to the skillet with the tomato sauce. Use a whisk to stir the sauce until the cream cheese has fully melted and the sauce is creamy. Add the Parmesan to the skillet and stir until it is melted into the sauce.

5.Add the fresh spinach to the skillet and gently stir it into the sauce until it has wilted (2-3 minutes). Add the pasta and stir until it is well coated in the creamy tomato sauce. Taste and adjust the salt and pepper as needed. Serve warm.

Meet DHT

The plane at the Visitor Stop has been put in place. The 1962 Cessna 182E VH-DMT was owned by Laurie Bain from Woodlands Station. The plane itself became well known in pastoral country and proved to be extremely reliable having never been involved in an accident or incident such as a forced landing. Laurie flew the aircraft for around 30 years and only once did the engine cough.

Laurie started his early mustering days as a spotter with well known aerial mustering pilots, John Roulston and Dick Scott. In 1967 he was granted an aerial mustering endorsement but only to fly on his own property and not below 500 feet. This was a joke , because it soon became apparent that unless the plane was fairly low and made a bit of noise it was ignored by those chewing their cuds, camped by a pool under the shade of a gum tree. With the growing acceptance of aerial mustering people like Laurie were drawn into it and they were kept pretty busy mustering on other stations. In 1988 Laurie received a letter from the Department of Transport Civil Aviation granting him approval to act as an approved pilot for aerial stock mustering then in 1990 he was granted approval as a pilot who may conduct aerial stock mustering training and checking.

The family sold Woodlands Station in 2009. DMT was hangared at Mt Augustus Station with the good grace of the Hammarquist family until Laurie agreed and was very happy to have her retired here in Gascoyne Junction on display for all to share.






