FLOODING AT MOUNT AUGUSTUS



After suffering through drought conditions for over twelve months we have finally had some relief when ex-tropical Cyclone Damien dropped a significant amount of rain in our catchment area which resulted in flooding to pastoral properties within our Shire boundary and Meekatharra boundary.

It is always great to see the might river flowing however it sometimes comes at a cost, both financial and personal.

NEWS FROM THE STATIONS

On the subject of the recent bush fires in the Gascoyne /Carnarvon region, Waddy Robinson writes:

On the 27th December 2011 lightning started a fire of the west side of the Kennedy Range. A better plan and better use of machinery would have put this fire out before it got so big. After all the lovely rains over the last 14 months (802mm at Doorwarrah) there was a huge body of dry feed. The fire burned differently, depending on whether it went through, day time or night time and also how much wind at the time.

In some sections, early morning and late afternoon/night- time , the fire was very sedate, so that machines and vehicles could work along the fire front very closely and with good results. However, the opposite was also possible; midday with strong wind and high dry temperatures created very dangerous conditions.

At all times, a plane with a Mustering Pilot is needed to co-ordinate all efforts and watch so that firefighters don't get trapped . All machines, vehicles and homesteads must have UHF Radios, any machine or vehicle without a radio should not be there. Throughout this fire, which I was flying through for about ten days, the radio channel was 39. At times there were up to 6 active sections, so this became confusing for Ground Crew. Different channels for different sections is the way to go!

Graders clearing up firebreaks should use the toe (leading edge) of the blade on the fire side. The same goes for Dozers and Loaders, and all debris should be pushed away from the fire side. Whenever possible, firefighters should be using natural land systems to help in the effort: bare strips of country, claypans and existing roads/tracks. At the same time, they should be mindful of the current wind and what changes are likely. If you don't have a Fire Unit, get one. It's worth it even if it's only to control backburn around the house, sheds, water and power supplies. Hopefully, you won't need it.


Why did you move to Gascoyne Junction? An opportunity became available to start a new career in local government and I had been looking to move back to the country and it just all fell into place at the right time!

Call for robust regional rain fall monitoring and water gauging stations

Past and recent flooding along the Gascoyne River and across regional WA has Member for North West Central, Vince Catania again calling for more robust monitoring of rainfalls and water levels across river systems.

"Rivers like the Gascoyne are subject to varying degrees of flooding with water flow often originating many hundreds of kilometres away".

"It's imperative communities, pastoralists and travellers in isolated and remote areas located downstream are forewarned of conditions, particularly where it hasn't rained, with safety and the protection of people and infrastructure being a priority", said Vince.

"Significant flood damage at Mt Augustus Station in the Southern Rangelands from rainfall generated upstream by Ex-Tropical Cyclone Damien is another timely reminder that better warning systems are required", said Vince.

"The levels of this flood would be by far the worst we have seen and with the tourist season starting to kick in around May and increasing interest in Mt Augustus, the world's largest monolith, we've got some work ahead to get things sorted in time", said Station owner, Don Hammarquist.

"The fact that we only had 30mm of rain at the homestead and managed to be inundated with raging flood waters, surely highlights the need for more warning to provide a better opportunity to protect infrastructure and livestock, ensure people are safe and help mitigate the enormous financial impact", said Don.

"An extreme flood event in 2010 caused irreparable damage to the towns of Gascoyne Junction and Carnarvon, impacting communities and pastoral and horticultural properties along the river systems".

"Lives were at risk with fast flowing excessive water causing severe damage and destruction to roads, with the loss of livestock, produce and infrastructure in the pastoral and horticultural areas and townships. Local businesses have been scared with some still recovering financially and emotionally", said Vince.

"Forewarned is forearmed which in remote regional areas is paramount with the impact of significant events often exacerbated by limited resources, communication and assistance being available."

"I call on the Minister for Water and the Minister for Emergency Services to urgently review regional river water gauges and rainfall monitoring systems, and install additional sites where needed to assist in providing communities with every opportunity to stay safe and protect lives, properties and businesses".

Free mammograms for CARNARVON women

BreastScreen WA invites women 50 to 74 years to have a FREE screening mammogram. **(All women 40 years and over are eligible)**. BreastScreen WA's mobile service will be at a **new location** at **Carnarvon Civic Centre Carpark, 1 Camel Lane** from 30/03/2020 to 28/04/2020.

Breast cancer is the most common life threatening cancer for women and 1 in 7 women in Australia will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.

Having a screening mammogram (breast x-ray) every two years significantly increases the chance of a woman surviving breast cancer and reduces the amount of treatment required. More than 75% of breast cancers occur in women over the age of 50. Research shows that screening is most effective for this age group.

BreastScreen WA's Medical Director Dr Elizabeth Wylie, said screening mammography was the most effective method for early detection of breast cancer.

"Screening every two years is vitally important to increase the chance of a breast cancer being detected when it is too small to feel or be noticed. Finding a cancer at this early stage often means that the breast cancer is small and more treatable".

"A free screening mammogram is one of the best things that women can do to look after their health. Breast screening saves lives and only takes 20 minutes," said Dr Wylie.

Screening mammograms may detect 70-90% of breast cancers.

Any woman with a persistent change in a breast should see her doctor immediately.

UPPER GASCOYNE RIVER COOK'S

Creamy Curried Sausages

Ingredients

- beef sausage (thick)
- 1 onion (sliced)
- 1 carrot (diced)
- 1 tsp sweet paprika
- 1 tsp turmeric
- 1 tsp curry powder
- freshly cracked pepper
- 2 zucchini (sliced)
- 100 g green beans
- 375 ml light & creamy evaporated milk
- 1 cup water
- 1 tsp cornflour
- 1 tbsp. brown sugar

Method

In a frying pan, cook the sausages until just done, slice and set aside. Discard residual oil from the pan. In the same pan, add the onion, carrot and cook until the onion is transparent.

Add the paprika, turmeric, pepper, brown sugar and curry powder. Fry this for 2 minutes.

Add the sliced sausages to the pan with the evaporated milk and stir.

Mix the cornflour into the glass of water and add to the pan.

Stir continuously until the sauce thickens.

Add the zucchini and beans and cook for 3 minutes..Serve with rice or mashed potatoes.



Potato Pancakes

Ingredients

- 500 g desiree potato (grated, peeled)
- 500 g sweet potato (grated, peeled)
- 1/2 cup plain flour
- 2 eggs (lightly beaten)
- 4 spring onions (sliced, washed)
- 1 pinch salt
- 1 pinch pepper
- oil (for frying)
- sour cream (*to serve)
- beetroot (chopped, to serve)
- salad leaves (*to serve)

Method

Combine all the ingredients except the oil in a mixing bowl. Heat 2-3mm of oil in a non-stick frying pan on high.

Place a spoonful of potato mixture into the hot oil and gently flatten. For a perfect shape use a deep egg ring.

Allow a crust to form on the bottom before attempting to move or turn them. It should take around 5 minutes, each side, on a medium-high heat.

Remove potato patties from the pan and drain well on paper towel. Repeat until all the mixture is used. Serve with sour cream, beetroot and salad leaves.

Add the zucchini and beans and cook for 3 minutes..Serve with rice or mashed potatoes.

Sponge Cake

Ingredients

- 4 extra large eggs (separated)
- 3/4 cup CSR Caster Sugar
- 1/2 cup wheaten cornflour
- 1/4 cup custard powder
- 1 tsp cream of tartar
- 1/2 tsp bi-carb soda

Method

Preheat oven to 180°C (160°C fan-forced). Grease and flour dust the base and sides of 2, 20cm cake tins.

Place egg whites into the bowl of an electric beater. Beat until firm peaks have formed. Gradually add sugar a little at a time, until all has been added. Add egg yolks and beat until well combined.

Sieve the flour, custard powder, cream of tartar and bi-carb soda three times. Gradually add flourmixture to eggs a little at a time, folding with a large metal spoon whilst adding. Do not over mix.

Divide mixture between prepared pans and cook for 18 minutes, until golden, the sponge has just started to come away from the sides and the top springs back when touched. Allow to cool slightly before removing to a wire rack to cool completely.



Chocolate Pancakes

Ingredients

- 2 cups self-raising flour
- 3 tbsp. caster sugar
- 1/2 cup cocoa (sifted)
- pinch of salt
- 2 eggs (lightly beaten)
- 2 cups milk
- 1/4 cup maple syrup
- 1/4 cup butter, for cooking (or oil spray)

Method

In a bowl, combine the flour, sugar, cocoa powder and pinch of salt. The salt will bring out the chocolate flavour in the cocoa powder.

Gradually whisk in the eggs and the milk. Stir in the maple syrup.

Mix until a thick, smooth batter forms.

Heat a frying pan over a medium heat and brush with melted butter.

Cook ¼ cup measures of this mixture in the pan. When bubbles form on the top, flip over to cook the other side.

Keep in a warm place while you cook the rest of the batter. This recipe makes 16 pancakes.

Serve with vanilla ice cream or chocolate sauce and fresh strawberries






