Dear Readers

As I have kept you all informed of my current health issues it is only right that I continue to keep you up to date. Recently I went to Perth and had an ultra-scan on a lymph node in my neck that was showing a bit of action in a recent PET scan. They did a fine needle biopsy and unfortunately this revealed that the melanoma in my cheek had spread. Given this, the decision was made to remove all the lymph nodes in my neck, accordingly I have been under the knife where they laid me open from the ear to the throat. The surgeon advised that four of 30 lymph nodes were affected; however, he believes he has got it all out as far as he can see. As cancer is at the cellular level I am now required to get a dose or 30 of radiation therapy. I will be away from the 3rd of December through to the 28th of January 2019. Whilst away Jarrod Walker will be the Acting CEO. I will still have access to all my emails and I will have my telephone so will still be able to contribute. I thank all those who have wished me well, fingers crossed we can beat this bastard, I know I will give it my best shot, I also thank Council and staff for their support.

Dave and Nat have commenced fogging for mosquitoes around town as the weather gradually warms up, they have also been busy weeding, spraying and general duties around town. Nat and Dave have also repaired the solar pump tracking, tidied up the tip and continued with the town maintenance and gardening.

The CRBA held their AGM on the 26th of October in Carnarvon. Dave Higgs attended on the Shire's behalf. The aerial baiting run has been completed. At the time of writing Dave is compiling a list of which stations were serviced and which were missed. Dave is continuing with following up permits and aligning us with protocol. The Mesquite spraying programme is set to begin again this year, the herbicide has been delivered and the crew commenced at the end of October.

Shiney has relocated the old house from the old caravan park which will allow us to commence installing the new war memorial in time for ANZAC day ceremonies next year. We have also had Quantum Surveyors conduct a pickup of the old caravan park which will be used to plan the proposed tourist stop facility.



We have had major disruptions to Ullawarra Road for which I had to close it to the general public, as the road was in an unsafe condition. The vast majority of the damage was caused by contractors associated with the Yangibana Rare Earth Project. I have provided an exemption for Pastoral Activities and the Dampier Bunbury Natural Gas Pipeline personnel. It is estimated the damage is in the order of \$2,600,000.00. I have appointed TALIS as the primary conduit to work out a plan with Hastings to undertake the remedial works and have this road re-opened, the reason for this appointment is to ensure that we have one point of contact to avoid mixed messages and confusion of who said what.

I am pleased to advise that the Shire are the recipient of \$2,828,684.00 funding under the Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program. Hastings have provided a letter to confirm that they will commit the additional \$2,828,684.00 thus providing a total project budget of \$5,657,369.00. The purpose of this grant is for the widening of roads and intersections, installing signs, widening stock grids and causeways and line marking at various locations across the Gascoyne Key Route, will improve productivity for primary producers and the mining and tourist industries, and improve safety.







PRINCIPAL'S POST

Hello there Parents, Carers and Community members,

One the most frequent conversations Educators have with parents and carers is around the question, "How well is my child progressing?"

Whilst the Principal can give a general professional opinion about what has been observed, noted or discussed, to get the real nitty gritty of an individual's development, your child's teacher is the one to see. In the classroom you will see work samples, anecdotal notes, test results and the context in which your child is working. You have the opportunity to share knowledge about your child that will assist the teacher to better plan for them.

As a school's population is a reflection of the community in which the school is located, this too needs to be considered. At Gascoyne Junction we are blessed with cultural and social diversity. As soon as the word "**reports**" raises its head in Term 4, it is full steam ahead as staff race against that old enemy time...to complete goals prior to Christmas! As in previous years, the school will conduct a Celebration of Learning where students' progress is formally recognised and celebrated. This takes place on Thursday 13th December and is followed by the Shire Christmas party. Please keep an eye out for your invitation.

Time capsule

On the 24th October 1993 a time capsule was buried to celebrate 100 years of Education in W.A. It was buried by Les Kempton and Steffan Silcox. On November the 3rd 2018, we opened the capsule as decreed by the inscription written on the plaque some 25 years ago.

At the beginning of the day we were concerned that attendance was not as high as we would have hoped. But as the time ticked away more and **MOre** and **More** people gathered outside the Community Resource Centre for the digging up of the Time Capsule. It had been below ground for 25 years!

It was with pleasure we welcomed all to the event. We made our way across to the area where the capsule was located. Councillor Jim Caunt kindly dropped himself into the metre deep pre-dig to access the capsule. Vince Catania MLA was by his side to assist in the delicate extraction.









It was warm and the digging continued. Wonder was in the air as it was debated whether the wide, white PVC pipe could have been the passage of a sewerage or water line for Junction. Finally the cylinder was found to have a lid, then the other end was uncovered. Carefully it was removed and examined. Here it was the 25 year old time capsule clearly marked "School"!

Speculation mounted when the call went out "There's another one in here!"

Everyone huddled around the hole and peered into its depths. Sure enough another cylinder was there. When it was hauled from the ground, the word Shire was written clearly on the outside.

Of course that proved a conundrum. Was this to be opened now too? Some said "Yes", some said "No".

The decision was made to hand over the capsule to the Shire of Upper Gascoyne CEO Mr John McLeary. "I'll have to do some research" was the cry. No doubt another event may soon be in the wind.











All of us traipsed across to the school where Ms Theona Mitchell Smith opened the capsule and read some of the written information from 25 years ago. Members of the community perused old newspapers, and photos, read about dreams, goals, predictions and wondered what could be on the Video that was encased within the capsule.

A new time capsule was buried on this day in 2018 by Abigail and Santanah, the youngest and oldest student at the event on the day. It is to be opened in 25 years' time on 3rd November 2043.







On this day, a 2007 capsule, which was found in the deep dark recesses of the Junction cupboards, was also buried. This capsule is due to be opened in 25 years on 3rd November in 2032.

The school is now in the process of collating the information from the 1993 capsule into a history display for all to enjoy in the near future.

Thanks to Margaret Rowe-the instigator of this great event, the tireless staff for assisting with organisation, the students of Gascoyne Junction Remote Community School for their contributions to the time capsule and you the Gascoyne Junction Community for supporting this event. What a great day!









Risk versus no risk behaviour

How often is the cause of crashes, resulting in people being killed or seriously injured (KSI), a driver who is engaging in risky illegal behaviour such as speeding, drink driving, not wearing a seatbelt or helmet? We may think that if we can remove these behaviours, our road safety issues would be fixed. However research shows that there are many more KSIs through non-risk behaviours – that is mistakes. The graph below shows the gap between the two. The blue line is the risk/illegal behaviours whilst the red one are the mistakes/errors of judgement.

People KSI involving primary risk taking behaviour¹

While continuing working on reducing illegal, risky behaviour is needed, it is important to look at how we can reduce KSIs caused by people making mistakes, after all people are fallible. The safe system approach does this through a holistic view which provides a framework to assess, guide and improve travel safety. The approach does not ignore risk taking behaviour, but acknowledges that people are fallible and that there needs to be allowances for human error.



Duck a l'Orange modern style



INGREDIENTS

1 Whole Duck

Orange Salt Rub

2 tblsp flaked salt

2 blood oranges, zested

1 sml sprig rosemary, finely chopped

1/4 tsp black pepper

Blood Orange Sauce

2 zested blood oranges, Juiced

2 blood oranges, thinly sliced

½ cup sugar

½ cup duck stock

2 tblsp verjuice

1 tsp cornflour

1 tblsp water

1 tblsp butter, cubed

METHOD

- 1. Rinse the whole duck under running water. Thoroughly pat dry with paper towel inside and out.
- 2. In a small bowl combine the flaked salt, blood orange zest, rosemary and black pepper. Use the back of a small spoon to blend.
- 3. Place the duck onto the roasting rack inside the roasting pan and liberally sprinkle the flavoured salt over the duck.
- 4. Roast the duck in the pre-heated oven 180c for 40 minutes per Kg until golden and juices run clear when tested. Remove duck from oven and allow to rest 10 -15 minutes.

Sauce

Place the blood orange juice, slices, sugar, stock and ver juice into the saucepan and simmer over medium heat 8 minutes. Whisk in the combined cornflour and water and stir until liquid boils. Remove from heat and cool 2 minutes, whisk in the cubed butter.

To Serve

Serve roasted duck with seasonal vegetables and drizzle with Blood Orange sauce.

CHEF'S TIPS

If blood oranges are not available use sweet navels or valencia oranges. Replace blood orange juice with pomegranate or cranberry juice for a delicious difference.



Chocolate Christmas pudding



METHOD

INGREDIENTS

375 gram mixed dried fruit

1/2 cup orange juice

1/2 cup brandy

225 gram unsalted butter, softened

3/4 cup brown sugar

3 eggs

1 cup breadcrumbs

1 cup plain flour, sifted

1/4 cup cocoa

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon ground allspice

icing sugar, raspberries, blueberries, custard, to

In a large glass bowl, combine fruit, juice and brandy. Cover with plastic wrap. Set aside for 30 minutes.

Preheat oven to 160°C. Lightly grease a 2-litre pudding basin and line base with baking paper.

In a large bowl, using an electric mixer, beat butter and sugar together until creamy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Fold in breadcrumbs, sifted combined flour, cocoa, spices and fruit with brandy.

Bake for 2 hours until cooked when tested. Cool in basin for 5 minutes before turning onto a cooling rack.

Spoon mixture into basin, smoothing top. Cover with baking paper and lid (or a layer of foil and secure with string).

Serve dusted with icing sugar, topped with raspberries and blueberries. Accompany with custard If liked.

To make homemade custard; bring 2 cups milk with 1 teaspoon vanilla just to the boil. Beat 4 egg yolks, ½ cup sugar and 1 tablespoon cornflour. Whisk in milk. Stir over low heat until just boiling. Stir in 2 tablespoon brandy. Cover with plastic wrap touching surface if not used straight away.


