Hello Readers

It has been a very busy month, and in the lead up to Christmas it is not going to get any quieter. I attended the Mount Augustus Long Table Dinner on the 8th of September 2018. There were about 200 guests in attendance, making this largest event held by Mount Augustus Tourist Park. The meals and entertainment were fantastic, I had the opportunity to take Peter Hutchinson with me; Councillors Walker and McKeough were also in attendance.

On September the 14th I attended the Carnarvon School of the Air 50th Anniversary Boots and Black Tie Ball at Wooramel River Side Retreat. It was a very well organised and run event which was enjoyed by all who attended. It was great to see so many people support the event with the funds raised going to a very valuable organisation that supports children within our Shire.

Work for the new War Memorial at the proposed new town development site (the old caravan park) will be taking place in the coming weeks when the house has been relocated to Hatch Street. Once this is done then our town works crew will be able to prepare the site and lay the footings in preparation of erecting the War Memorial.

Unfortunately the Shire has had to close the Ullawarra Road and Edmund Gifford Creek Road to all traffic until the 22nd of October (Under Section3.5(2) all vehicles associated with Pastoral Activities are exempt) due to the severity of the damage that the road has sustained. It is not ideal and it did impact on travel arrangements by tourists to our region, but it was necessary for the safety of our patrons and to prevent further damage to the road.

On a more positive note is the news is that the Shire have just been advised that we have been successful in securing a further \$2,828,684 under the Heavy Vehicle Safety and Production Program to carry out up-grades on Ullawarra Road, the Shire will need to raise a further \$2,828,684 from external sources as our contribution toward a total project cost of \$5,657,369.00. After discussions with Hastings Technology Metals Ltd, they have confirmed that they will match the co-contribution amount that is required to proceed with the upgrade.

I am also excited to announce that Horizon Power have sponsored our Community Christmas Party with a donation of \$2,000. The Horizon Power 2018 Community Christmas Party will be taking place on Thursday 13th December, as in previous years there will be a free Community Christmas dinner and we ask that all community members please bring a side dish or a dessert to share on the evening.

Melbourne Cup is almost upon us again, this year the Junction Pub and Tourist Park have offered to host this event for our community, so don't forget to grab a ticket and watch all the action on their big screen!

For the rest of October I will be in and out of the office periodically, so I have appointed Jarrod Walker as the acting CEO. I will still be available by email and mobile phone during this time.

HASTINGS TECHNOLOGY METALS LIMITED YANGIBANA RARE EARTHS PROJECT ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW DOCUMENT (ERD) (1 October 2018 – 28 October 2018)

Hastings Technology Metals Limited is proposing to develop the Yangibana Rare Earths Project (the Proposal), located approximately 270 km east-northeast of Carnarvon, in the Upper Gascoyne region of Western Australia (WA). The Proposal will involve mining above and below the ground water table, on-site processing of ore, water abstraction, and transport via road to Geraldton or Fremantle port for export.

An Environmental Review Document (ERD) has been prepared by Hastings Technology Metals Limited in accordance with Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) procedures and is released for public review. The ERD describes the proposal, examines the likely environmental effects and the proposed environmental management procedures associated with the proposed development.

THE FUTURE IS 'ROSI' FOR KEY ROADS

The 10-year, \$3.5 billion Roads of Strategic Importance (ROSI) initiative, will see significant investment in key road freight and tourism corridors, as part of the Australian Government's commitment to deliver game-changing productivity improvements across Australia's supply chains.

Federal Member for Durack, Melissa Price, was pleased principles had been released to help prioritise investments and ensure funding would be directed at improving road reliability, and better connect communities.

"Works funded through the ROSI are expected to make a real difference to local communities, through sealing, flood immunity improvements, road strengthening and widening, pavement rehabilitation, bridge and culvert upgrades and road realignments to freight roads and transport hubs".

"The pinch points targeted through this funding will help to ensure industry can efficiently move freight from key agricultural and mining areas, to transport hubs and processing facilities."

"The stakeholder consultations across Northern Australia are particularly important for my constituents

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development Michael McCormack said the Roads of Strategic Importance initiative would deliver targeted upgrades across corridors to provide a more reliable road network, improve access for higher capacity vehicles, and better connect regional communities.

"Investment in these strategic corridors will facilitate regional economic growth by helping support the expansion of key local industries, improve connectivity and access, while also improving safety on these key roads," Mr McCormack said.

New meningococcal vaccine to support Durack teenagers 1 October 2018

The Federal Government will invest \$52 million to protect Australian teenagers, including those in the Durack electorate, against meningococcal, with the launch of a new free national program for 14- to 19-year-olds.

Member for Durack and Minister for the Environment Melissa Price said more than one million teenagers will receive the free meningococcal A, C, W and Y vaccine, over the next four years.

"It will be added to the National Immunisation Program from April 2019 and provided to students aged 14 to 16 years under a school based program," she said.

"Adolescents aged 15 to 19 years of age, who have not already received the vaccine in school, will be able to receive the vaccine through an ongoing GP-based catch up program."

Meningococcal is a rare but very serious infection that occurs when meningococcal bacteria from the throat or nose invades the body. The consequences are devastating for individuals and their families.

"In recent years we have seen a rise in the number of invasive meningococcal disease cases in Australia. In 2017, there were 382 cases reported nationally, compared with 252 cases in 2016 and 182 cases in 2015," Minister Price said.

"Deaths associated with meningococcal disease have also risen dramatically, with 28 deaths in 2017, compared with 11 deaths in 2016 and 12 deaths in 2015."

The announcement follows a recommendation from the Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee (PBAC) to list the meningococcal A, C, W and Y vaccine for adolescents.

The Committee is independent of Government by law and in practice. By law the Federal Government cannot list a new medicine or vaccine without a positive recommendation from PBAC.

Minister Price said from July 1, every 12-month-old in the country is offered a free ACWY meningococcal vaccine and every mother is given the opportunity to vaccinate against whooping cough with a free vaccine.

"I encourage everyone to get the facts about immunisation by visiting: health.gov.au/immunisation," the Minister said.

WARTIME SNAPSHOTS

The 2018 Remembrance Day posters feature four portraits of Australians who served at Gallipoli in 1915, which were created by combining hundreds of portraits of men and women who have served in our defence forces over the past century. Representing the Royal Australian Navy (RAN) is a portrait of Commander Leighton Bracegirdle DSO. He commanded the 1st Royal Australian Naval Bridging Train at Suvla Bay, Gallipoli, in 1915.

The Australian Army's portrait is of Private Frederick James Adams, 8th Battalion, who was killed in action during the landings at Gallipoli on 25 April 1915.

The Royal Australian Air Force's (RAAF) portrait is Lieutenant Alexander Finnie, 4th Squadron Australian Flying Corps (AFC), who was evacuated from Gallipoli with gas poisoning in August 1915 before joining the AFC.

Sister Rachael Pratt represents the service of women in the defence force over the past century. She served with the Australian Army Nursing Service at Gallipoli and was awarded a Military Medal for bravery whilst serving under fire in France.



1080 baiting: a risk to domestic pets

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development advises that baiting programs using 1080 are carried out across the state, and are aimed at controlling wild dogs, foxes, feral cats, feral pigs and rabbits.


Baiting of pastoral leases, Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) reserves, unallocated Crown Lands and freehold farms may be carried out at any time. The poison baits remain toxic for many months. You need to exercise caution when working within, or visiting these areas. Warning signs are placed where applicable on pastoral, DBCA, unallocated Crown Land and main access roads in agricultural areas.

Do not rely upon the presence of warning signs

Signage may not be in the immediate vicinity and can be weather damaged, removed or destroyed. Please consult with individual pastoralists, DBCA and/or farmers prior to entering their lands. Baiting may take place adjacent to such areas and domestic pets should be kept close and under control at all times. Owners may consider the use of muzzles for their domestic pets.

1080 baiting is part of the integrated pest management program to protect livestock from death and injury, reduce the impact upon agricultural production and help preserve the unique flora and fauna of WA.

If poisoning occurs, please seek immediate medical attention or veterinary assistance or contact the Poisons Information Centre on 13 11 26.

Finding Breast Cancer Early



October is breast cancer awareness month.

Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in WA women, who have a 1 in 10 chance of being diagnosed by age 75. Men can also get breast cancer although it is rare.

Throughout regional WA, the Find Cancer Early program is urging people to pay attention to changes in their body and if they notice anything unusual, to tell their doctor.

What are the common symptoms of breast cancer?

- New persistent pain or discomfort
- A change in shape, size or feel of your breasts
- Any lump or lumpiness or thickening of the breast or under your arm
- Changes in the skin such as puckering, redness or dimpling of the breast
- Any change in nipple position or nipple discharge

If you have had any of these symptoms, tell your doctor. It doesn't mean you've got breast cancer, but it's important to tell your doctor and get checked.

Remember, if it is breast cancer, the earlier it's found, the greater the chance of successful treatment.

Thanks to research and advances in early detection, screening and prevention, more than 90 per cent of women with breast cancer are still alive 5 years after diagnosis.

How you can check your breasts

Take the time to become breast aware; in the shower, when getting dressed, looking in the mirror, putting on body lotion, lying down in bed and feel your breasts, this helps you know what is normal for you, so you can notice any changes.

- Remember to feel all the breast tissue, from the collarbone to below the braline and under the armpit.
- Use the flat part of your fingers and finger pads to feel near the surface and deeper in the breast.

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, 6 ounces each

3 tbsp. flour

1 1 large shallot 10-ounce package sliced cremini mushrooms

1 large shallot

1 clove garlic

1/2 cup. low-sodium chicken broth

1/2 cup. marsala wine

Method

Using the flat-side of a meat mallet or bottom of a heavy saucepan, pound the chicken breasts to 1/2 inch thick. Season with 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt and1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper. Lightly coat the chicken breasts with flour. Heat 1 tablespoon olive oil in a large skillet on medium and cook chicken until golden brown, 4 to 5 minutes per side; transfer to a plate.

While the chicken is cooking, finely chop the shallot and garlic.

Add 1 tablespoon olive oil to same skillet. Cook the sliced cremini mushrooms on mediumhigh, tossing occasionally, until golden brown, 5 minutes. Add the chopped shallot and garlic. Season with 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper; cook 2 minutes.

Add the low-sodium chicken broth and Marsala wine to the skillet along with the browned chicken and its juices and simmer until the liquid is reduced by half, 4 minutes. Sprinkle with chopped parsley. Serve with sautéed spinach.

Red Velvet Cheesecake



INGREDIENTS
350G PLAIN CHOCOLATE BISCUITS
1/3 CUP (40G) ALMOND MEAL (GROUND ALMONDS)
100G UNSALTED BUTTER, MELTED
DUTCH COCOA, FOR DUSTING

FILLING

250G CREAM CHEESE, CHOPPED

3/4 CUP (150G) RICOTTA

1/2 CUP (110G) CASTER (SUPERFINE) SUGAR

2 EGGS

1 TEASPOON VANILLA EXTRACT

100G DARK CHOCOLATE, MELTED

1/2 TABLESPOONS RED FOOD COLOURING

METHOD

Place the biscuits and almond meal in the bowl of a food processor and process until coarse crumbs form. Add the butter and process until combined.

Line the base of 4 x 10cm-round lightly greased spring form tins with non-stick baking paper.

Using the back of a spoon, press the crumb mixture into the bases and sides of the tins. Refrigerate for 30 minutes—1 hour or until cold.

Preheat oven to 140°C (275°F).


To make the filling, place the cream cheese, ricotta and sugar in the bowl of a food processor and process for 2–3 minutes or until smooth.

Scrape down the sides of the bowl, add the eggs and vanilla and process for a further 1 minute. Add the chocolate and food colouring and process until well combined.

Divide the mixture over the bases and bake for 40–45 minutes or until set. Allow the cakes to stand at room temperature for 30 minutes before refrigerating for 2–3 hours or until cold.

Dust with the cocoa just before serving. Serves 4–6.


