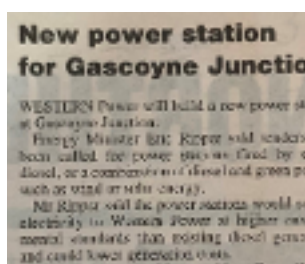

COUNCIL NEWS

CEO Update

Another month gone in the blink of an eye. On Wednesday the 12th of May I attended a phone meeting with the new Minister for Local Government, the Hon John Carey, MLA. The purpose was to get an idea of his agenda for the Local Government sector. On the same day the LEMC meeting was held our bi-partisan partners, the Shire of Carnarvon, primarily to discuss issues surrounding Emergency Management. I also met up with the Carnarvon Shire President and their CEO to discuss issues pertaining to both Shires.

The second application round for the Corporate Services Officer position closed at the end of April resulting in 6 applications for the role. After reviewing all submissions, we selected our shortlist and arranged interviews to take place within the fortnight. At the time of writing this report, interviews have been conducted and further considerations are being made as to who the successful applicant is for the job.

The 2021 Local Government Transport and Roads Forum scheduled for the 14th of May 2021 was cancelled due to the COVID 19 outbreak in the Perth and Peel regions and has been rescheduled for the 1st of July 2021. I have indicated that I will be available to present at this forum.

Work is continuing with the Junction Pub and Tourist Precinct with the specifications and tender documents being assembled in order to go out to Public Tender.

Considerable work is going into delivering on our OH&S responsibilities and trying to determine the best and most cost effective way of delivering this to our organisation.

I have been kept busy on weekends assisting tourists that were stuck at the Lyons River Crossing and unfortunately an operator from THEM Earthmoving also needed assistance after badly breaking his leg whilst working out on Pimbee Road. I would like to thank Alys McKeough for assisting with her medical expertise as this was a very traumatic event for all concerned.

I can advise that we were unsuccessful in our grant application under the National Flood Mitigation Program, Western Australia only got one project and this was the Warmun Community Risk Mitigation

Representatives of the DBCA were in town and advised that they have employed two rangers for Burringurrah and were doing interviews for the Junction / Kennedy Ranges. Appointments for the two senior rangers is still progressing.

I am advised by staff that the Junction Netball Team are dominating the Carnarvon Netball Competition and remain undefeated at the time of writing this report.

Corporate Services Update

It has been business as usual for the corporate team with preparation commencing on the 21/22 budget, staff getting ready for the end of financial year, liaising with our newly appointed auditors and seeing the first trickle of visitors into the area.

We received formal advice from the Office of the Auditor General (OAG) that William Buck has been appointed as the Shire's Auditors for a period of 3 years commencing this financial year. After receiving official notice from the OAG, I contacted the William Buck office and spoke to the Director responsible for managing our audit portfolio. The Auditors and I will work together to confirm dates for the Interim and EOFY audit and update Council accordingly.

The recent rainfall has created some challenges for visitors where it has restricted travel into some areas and in some instances has resulted in people getting stuck – this however, does not seem to have deterred people as we continue to see more foot traffic come through our neck of the woods which is certainly a welcome sight in our hopes to build on our tourism profile as a prime location to “wonder out yonder”.

Works Report:

Finally the good weather is here and the district has received more good rain, unfortunately it has put us behind again in our maintenance grading and bitumen works. On the bright side country is looking great, the cows are fat and the rain has settled the shoulder works on the Carnarvon Mullewa road.

The tourist stop project is progressing with contractors arriving to install reticulation and plumbing and concrete footings. Due to a shortage of grano workers in the northwest we have decided to precast the remaining concrete works off site. The project is still on track to finish in July.

The Carnarvon Horseman's Club held their annual Gascoyne Junction Gymkhana on the first weekend in May. The event was well attended and riders and spectators enjoyed the improve pindan surface that was installed with thanks to THEM Earthmoving and the Shire while QEM donated the use of their water cart on the day. After a great day riding those that stayed the night enjoyed a great quiz night at the pavilion with thanks to the Gascoyne Junction Remote Community School.

The tourist stop project is progressing with contractors arriving to install reticulation and plumbing and concrete footings. Due to a shortage of grando workers in the northwest we have decided to precast the remaining concrete works off site. The project is still on track to finish in July.

The Carnarvon Horseman's Club held their annual Gascoyne Junction Gymkhana on the first weekend in May. The event was well attended and riders and spectators enjoyed the improved pindan surface that was installed with thanks to THEM Earthmovers.

Town Works

We are still pushing hard to try and secure a reliable water source for our town reticulation. The latest river flow will push back our on-site inspection of an area we have identified as potentially having good yield and quality. The proposed location is within a shire road reserve approximately 1.5km to the west of the bridge. Once we are confident that the site is suitable we will engage the traditional owners and relevant stakeholders to begin the approval process.

The town oval fencing has been removed by the gang at Bidgemia, the new fence is on track to be installed in mid-June. The pavilion floor has been repainted and looks a treat, the improved floor surface has complimented the latest upgrades and revamping of the town facility. The staff parking structure has been constructed and has been a handy addition to the depot, the same contractor also erected the shade over the CEO house pool.

Maintenance Grading:

As mentioned the latest rainfall has altered our grading programme. Due to the wet start in the year we delayed our maintenance graders and utilised them on the bitumen projects. We have engaged QEM to grade from Cobra to Landor and RDC to grade from Lyons River to the top of Ullawarra road. Thomas will complete from Gascoyne Junction to Lyons River before heading up the Cobra Dairy Creek road.

Construction Crew:

Both bitumen projects are unfortunately slightly behind schedule due to rain and bitumen supplier shortage. Boral will arrive at the end of May and alternate between the two jobs until completed. Due to the setbacks caused by rain the Carnarvon Mullewa project is expected to go over budget by approximately \$100,000 however there is enough contingency money to cover this shortfall as well as complete an additional 1km of seal on the Landor project.

The Shire of Upper Gascoyne encourages visitors to experience our beautiful attractions and soak up everything the real Australian outback has to offer.

We are a large shire of 46,602 square kilometres with approximately 1,950kms of unsealed roads and our team takes great pride in looking after these roads to ensure everyone enjoys a safe comfortable drive.

Sometimes we need to close roads to traffic due to wet conditions. While this may be an inconvenience in the short term, we do it for your own safety and to ensure safe roads all year round for visitors and locals. It is important to check local weather conditions and forecasts before travelling on unsealed roads; this information can be found at www.bom.gov.au. Severe damage can occur to roads when people drive on closed or wet roads. It is not only extremely dangerous but can be costly for our shire to repair. Please consider those that live in the Shire of Upper Gascoyne and depend on these roads all year.

Please do not drive on our roads if they are closed. Penalties may apply to those who choose to ignore "Road Closed" signs and the shire may choose to prosecute offenders for the cost of repairs. If you have an accident or injury on a closed road, you may not be covered by your insurance company. This applies to locals and visitors alike.

We make every effort to minimise delays and appreciate your patience and assistance when roads are closed.

Coronavirus (COVID-19)

Information sheet – What you need to know

Take care of yourself, your family and community.

By being kind and staying calm you can help our mob stay strong.

This is an information sheet for Aboriginal people on what they need to know about the Coronavirus (COVID-19) – what it is, how it spreads, how it makes them feel and what they can do to help it stop spreading.

What is a Coronavirus?

Coronaviruses are a large family of viruses that can make people sick ranging from a mild cold to severe respiratory illness.

It is a new virus spreading across the world.

How does it make you feel?

Most people who get COVID-19 feel like they have a cold or flu.

Some people have mild symptoms and others can get very ill very quickly and need medical help.

What are the symptoms?

- Fever (sweats)
- Cough
- Shortness of breath
- Sore throat
- Fatigue (tiredness)

How does the virus spread?

It can spread from person to person through:

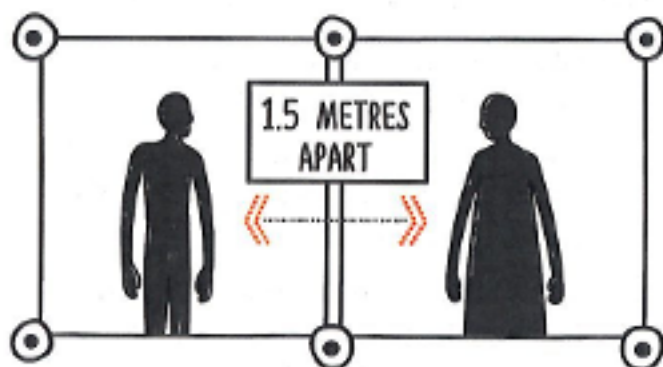
- Close contact with a person who is infectious with COVID-19.
- Touching or being in close contact with a person with confirmed COVID-19 who coughs or sneezes.
- Touching objects or surfaces like door handles, tables or phones that have cough or sneeze droplets from a sick person, and then touching your mouth or face.



Stop the spread

We need to take care of each other and keep our community safe by doing what we can to stop the virus bugs spreading to each other. This means practising good personal hygiene and physical distancing.

- Stay away from people who are sick with cold or flu symptoms.
- Stay home if you are sick and rest to stay strong.
- Stay 2 arms lengths away from everyone (at least 1.5 metres apart).



- Wash your hands a lot with soap and water (for 20 to 30 seconds) or use hand sanitiser especially before and after eating, after going to the toilet, and after coughing or sneezing.

- Cough and sneeze into a tissue or bent elbow, **NOT** into your hands.
- Throw used tissues in the bin.
- Avoid touching your face, especially your eyes, mouth and nose.
- Keep your distance – don't shake hands, kiss, hug or do high fives*
- Practise physical distancing when around big mobs of people like family and community gatherings.

AND

- If you are unwell with COVID-19 symptoms go to your nearest COVID clinic or GP respiratory clinic.

COVID-19 Vaccines

Mythbusters and frequently asked questions

Myths

Aboriginal people are being told to get the vaccine before everyone else

Australia's COVID-19 vaccines will become available in phases.

Priority groups have been identified for the first phases, including people that would be at a higher risk of serious illness if they contracted COVID-19, and those most likely to be exposed to it.

Phase 1a started in February and is well underway for our quarantine and border workers, frontline health care workers and aged care and disability care staff and residents.

Phase 1b is expected to start in March and not only includes Aboriginal people who are aged 55 and older, it also includes those who are at a higher risk of serious illness if they contract COVID-19. This includes older adults, health care workers, those with existing medical conditions, and critical and high-risk.

All people who live in remote communities will have the opportunity to receive the vaccine at the same time, regardless of which phase they may be in.

The COVID-19 vaccine is killing Aboriginal people or making them sick

The COVID-19 vaccine has not caused increased death rates in other communities where it has been widely used and there is no evidence that Aboriginal people react worse to the vaccine than others.

Some people may experience mild side effects after getting vaccination such as tiredness, muscle soreness and redness around the injection site and mild fever. This is normal for any vaccine.

Serious reactions from the vaccine are extremely rare and may occur within 15 minutes therefore you must stay with the nurse for 15 minutes (or longer if needed) after receiving the vaccine.

Aboriginal people are being used as guinea pigs for the vaccine

Aboriginal people are not the first people to receive the COVID-19 vaccines. Tens of millions of people across the world have already received the vaccine safely.

COVID-19 vaccination is voluntary. The COVID-19 vaccination is recommended to protect yourself, Elders and community.



The vaccine implants a microchip in me that will track our movements

The COVID-19 vaccines do not contain a tracking microchip and there is no evidence or data to support this. Microchips are too large to be administered through needle injection.

This conspiracy theory/rumour has been circulated across social media platforms, to create a fear of technology and a mistrust of Governments.

Rumours like these can cause mass scepticism of vaccines. It is best to receive your information from trusted sources including [health.wa.gov.au](https://www.health.wa.gov.au).

Frequently asked questions

The vaccines have been made so quickly, how can we be sure they are safe?

Safe and effective COVID-19 vaccines have been able to be developed faster than any other vaccine because of several reasons:

- A level of funding and commitment not seen before;
- The availability of new technologies; and
- Researchers and developer around the world working together.

Some steps of the clinical trials and approval processes have been done at the same time instead of one after the other. As soon as the preliminary data was available, the trials were able to progress. This has given us access to the vaccine as quickly as possible.

Only old people get or die from COVID so why should I get the vaccine?

Anyone can get COVID-19. The elderly and people with chronic conditions such as heart disease and diabetes are most at risk of serious COVID-19 infections.

Luckily, thanks to the hard work in our communities, numbers have been very low for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people with no deaths. However, there have still been approximately 150 cases so far and a vaccine is a safe and effective way to protect people against serious illness from COVID-19.

Just like the flu, it is important to get vaccinated to protect yourself, family, our vulnerable and our community.

Even if you are not an older person, you should still get vaccinated against COVID-19. The vaccine will strengthen your immune system by training it to recognise and fight the COVID-19 virus before it makes you very sick and pass it onto others.

Is there a difference to the vaccine that is being rolled out in our community to the ones that are rolled out across Australia and internationally?

Everyone in Australia will have access to more than one vaccine. Every vaccine that is available in Australia must firstly be approved by the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) and must meet strict standards for safety, quality and efficacy.

At this stage, there will be no difference in which vaccine is given in a remote Aboriginal community and the wider Australian community.



Can I choose which vaccine I get?

No. You cannot choose which vaccine you get. It will depend on vaccine availability and any determination made by the TGA. Those who are at greatest risk will be vaccinated first.

All registered and approved vaccines are effective in protecting against COVID-19 and serious illness caused by the virus.

Where can Aboriginal people get the vaccine?

The Australian government is working closely with States and Territory Governments and National Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisations (NACCHO) to ensure the vaccine is made available to all Aboriginal people.

There will be many sites across Australia where the vaccine will be made available. Many of them will be in rural and remote locations. This includes Western Australian state-run clinics, country hospitals, Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Services (ACHHS), GP-led Respiratory clinics, GP clinics and community pharmacies.

New power station for Gascoyne Junction

WESTERN Power will build a new power station at Gascoyne Junction.

Energy Minister Eric Ripper said tenders had been called for power stations fired by either diesel, or a combination of diesel and green power, such as wind or solar energy.

Mr Ripper said the power stations would supply electricity to Western Power at higher environmental standards than existing diesel generators and could lower generation costs.

Upper Gascoyne shire president Ross Collins said consumers in the shire would be grateful for the push to modernise power generation.

"It makes a lot of sense to encourage solar power," he said.

"There are nine months when it is hot and plenty of sun.

The Minister said Western Power would buy the electricity from the privately owned and operated stations and deliver it to customers in the town.

It was expected that construction would begin in January next year for the stations to be operating in October 2005.

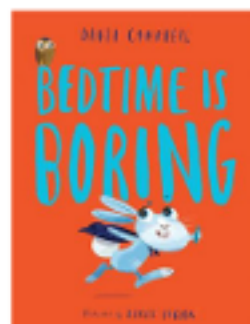

HEAL ME

Julia Buckley needs a miracle. She has a chronic pain condition and according to her doctors, it can't be cured. She doesn't believe them. She does believe in miracles, though.

Julia's search for a cure takes her on a global quest, exploring the boundaries between science, psychology and faith with practitioners on the fringes of conventional, traditional and alternative medicine. From neuroplastic brain rewiring in San Francisco to medical marijuana in Colorado, Haitian voodoo rituals to Brazilian 'spiritual surgery', she's willing to try anything. Can miracles happen? And more importantly, what happens next if they do?

Raising vital questions about the modern medical system, this is also a story about identity in a system historically skewed against 'hysterical' female patients, and the struggle to retain a sense of self under the medical gaze. *Heal Me* explains why modern medicine's current approach to chronic pain is failing patients. Suddenly, Ana is free to take English lessons at a local church, lie on the beach at Coney Island, see a movie at Radio City Music Hall, go dancing with Cesar, and imagine the possibility of a different kind of life in America. When Juan returns, Ana must decide once again between her heart and her duty to her family.

On Friday 4th June, the community is invited to a film premier to show case their creativity with their Awesome Arts project.

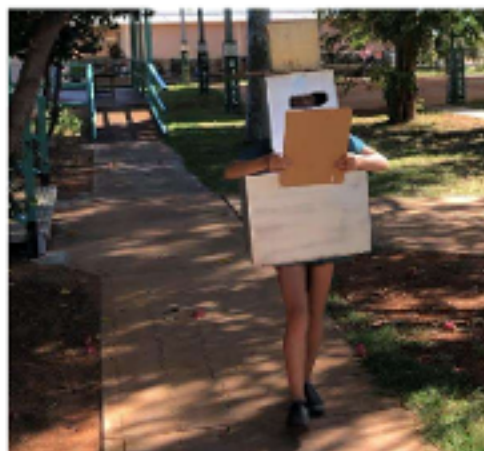
This will be held in the school library at 1.30pm followed by some light refreshments.

DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

As part of our learning in Digital Technologies, the students watched a video of robots and viewed a variety of images of different types of robots. We followed this up with a discussion about how the robots moved, how they looked, the colours that were used and the materials they used to make them. 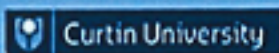

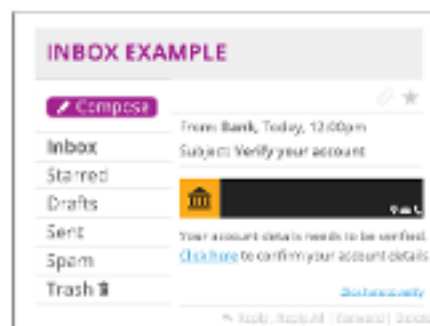
The phishing scam

Phishing scams are the most common form of scam on the internet. They usually start with an email or phone call that seems to be from a business you trust, asking you to 'confirm' your account details. When you confirm your details, they're actually being gathered by the scammer.

If you get an email asking for personal information, you should follow these steps:

- Don't click on any links in the email.
- Delete the email.
- Help others know about the scam by reporting it to the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission's (ACCC) ScamWatch website.

If you're really worried, you can always call the company that the email appears to be from directly. Just be sure to use your own contact information – not anything in the email.



This is a scam

Unexpected money

With this scam, you receive an email promising a lot of money in the future for a small upfront fee. Some examples include:

Avoiding scams

- An 'inheritance' that you can get if you only pay an admin fee.
- A 'lottery' that you've won, but you need to pay a fee to get paid out.
- A big payout in the future if you just help someone out right now.

If someone you don't know contacts you and offers a lot of money for a small upfront payment, it's probably a scam. Ignore that person and delete the email.

Money for nothing

These are scams that ask you to pay money for something that doesn't exist. Look for things like:

- Emails offering the opportunity to join a major investment opportunity, at a heavily discounted rate.
- People on dating websites that express deep affections for you very quickly, but then ask for help with medical and other expenses.
- Fake charities that contact you after major disasters.
- Callers telling you that there's a problem with your computer or your tax return.

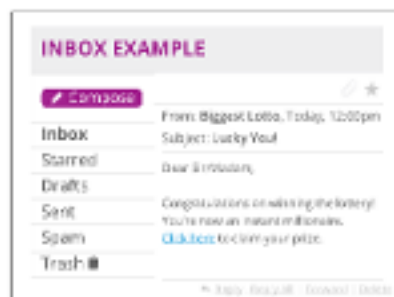
These are likely to be scams and should be ignored.

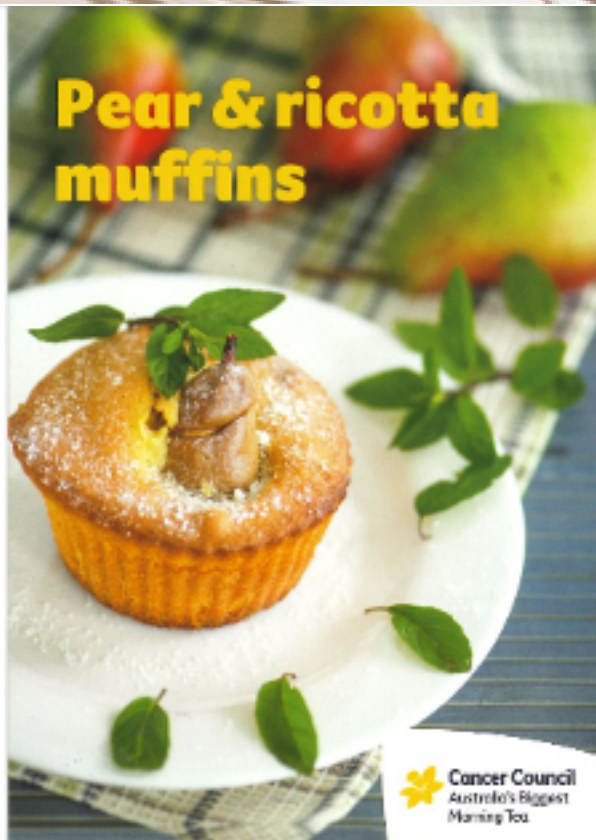

Pear & ricotta muffins

Pear & ricotta muffins

Serves 20 mini muffins

Ingredients


- 350g plain flour
- 3 tsp baking powder
- 75 gm brown sugar
- ½ tsp bicarbonate soda
- 135ml grapeseed oil
- 3 eggs lightly beaten
- 100g natural yoghurt
- 2 pears diced
- 150gm fresh ricotta

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 165°C fan-forced. Lightly grease a 24 cup mini muffin pan and line with grease proof paper.
2. Place the dry ingredients in one bowl and the wet ingredients in the other. Stir the wet ingredients into the dry ingredients until just combined. Overworking the batter will result in a dense muffin not a fluffy one.
3. Keep aside a few slices of pear to add to the top of the muffins before baking.
4. Spoon the mixture into the prepared muffin pan and bake for 30 minutes. Check with a skewer – inserting into the centre of the muffin – if it comes out clean the muffin is ready.
